As you read this, we find ourselves already a week into the 2023 Lenten season. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which fell on February 22 this year, and lasts 40 days (not including Sundays) before Easter. What is the deal with Lent, and why do we place ash on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday? Let's take a moment to look at where this church tradition originated, and how it can still be a valuable part of our Christian walk.

"LENT is an English word (stemming from an Anglo-Saxon word for "spring" and related to the English word "lengthen") that refers to the penitential period preceding Easter. Early Christians felt that the magnitude of the Easter celebration called for special preparation. As early as the second century, many Christians observed several days of fasting as part of that preparation. Over the next few centuries, perhaps in remembrance of Jesus' fasting for 40 days in the wilderness (Matt. 4:1-2), 40 days became the accepted length of the Lenten season. Since, from the earliest years of Christianity, it had been considered inappropriate to fast on the day of the resurrection, Sundays were not counted in the 40 days. Thus, the Wednesday 46 days before Easter came to be regarded as the beginning of Lent.

In the early centuries, the season before Easter was also the usual period of intense training for new Christians. During this period, the catechumens (those learning what it meant to be Christians) went through the final stages of preparation for baptism, which usually occurred at dawn on Easter Sunday. As the practice of infant baptism increased, the emphasis on Lent as a training period decreased."1

Today's church traditions for Lent vary from abstaining or "fasting" from meat on Fridays in Lent to giving up a vice (sweets, fatty foods, social media, foul language, etc.) for 40 days. This, of course, reminds us of the New Year resolutions that are so popular in the Western part of the world. But for the Christian, fasting

is a well-known part of Lent and is inspired by the fast of Jesus spending 40 days in the wilderness. (Matt 4:1-4) Christians partake in fasting to increase their self-control over worldly desires.

Another church tradition that is common today is giving of oneself, or almsgiving. Instead of "fasting from something," a person may make a point to give money, goods, or time during Lent. Regardless, the hope is that the Christian becomes penitent and remembers why Easter is important in the first place. After all, Easter is the goal that we are looking forward to in Lent. The sacrifice of Christ on the cross along with His resurrection over death three days later. One thing to keep in mind is that we cannot make sacrifices for our salvation. Lent isn't about you or I giving up something to make ourselves more holy, or less if we fail to perform our Lenten duties correctly.

So, what is the best use for Lent today? I suggest that we use this time to explore our faith intentionally. To turn from something that takes time every day in our routines and turn that time into learning about Christ and His love for us. For this season of Lent, begin each day with a 5-minute devotion and prayer. Take 10 minutes in the evening to read a bible passage. Instead of watching anything else on your device or tv, check out a resource on the Right Now media, or watch an episode of The Chosen. Remember, this season is not for us to perform a religious duty to try to impress God. It can be a time for us to grow closer in our walk with Him.





We have unclaimed serving containers in the fellowship hall that need to be claimed. Items left there at the end of March will be given a new home.








